Boarding in the Heart of Hobart

Collegiate boarders enjoy the best of both worlds — a warm, welcoming home on campus and the vibrant city of Hobart just beyond the gates. Located in the heart of the city, our Boarding House is just a short, safe stroll to shops, cinemas, galleries, cafes, parks and the famous Salamanca Market. Beaches, sporting venues and other local gems are easily reached by public transport — conveniently located right outside the door.

Our boarders live on the Senior School Campus in a friendly, close-knit community with access to a range of facilities. These include music practice rooms, a gym, student lounges, laundry facilities, a heated indoor pool and after-hours access to classrooms for quiet study. Wi-Fi is available throughout, and a kitchenette is available for snacks and drinks.

Boarding at Collegiate is more than accommodation — it's a lifestyle full of opportunity, connection and unforgettable experiences.

A Vibrant Social Life at Collegiate

Boarding at Collegiate is full of fun, friendship and unforgettable moments. We enjoy a close connection with our brother school, The Hutchins School, and each term our boarders join in exciting joint events — dances, bonfires, cooking nights and day trips. As members of the Australian Boarding Schools Association (ABSA), we also connect with boarders from other schools across Tasmania.

Life in the House

The Boarding House is a warm, welcoming space where friendships thrive. Activities like craft nights, dining out, movie marathons, and excursions are regularly on offer. Boarders also enjoy access to puzzles, games, Lego, Netflix, Nintendo, music rooms, sports gear and more. While some activities are planned, students are encouraged to take initiative and enjoy the many resources available.

Weekend Adventures

Weekends are all about connection and discovery. Knowing many boarders can't be with family, we ensure weekends are special, offering a variety of activities throughout the year — beach days, theatre trips, picnics, BBQs, movie nights and outings to explore the beauty and culture of Hobart and beyond.



A Global Community

Collegiate welcomes enrolments from families residing outside Australia. Over the years, the School has been home to students from around the world, whose diversity and different cultural heritage enrich the School community. The Boarding House provides a warm and caring environment where each student is valued and all nationalities, cultures and religions are respected.

Living together offers opportunities to share cultural traditions, experience global cuisines, and learn from each other's daily lives. While this multicultural setting is enriching, it also requires openness, patience, and a willingness to grow as global citizens.

Language can be a challenge, especially for international students adjusting to an English-speaking environment. While maintaining their first language supports wellbeing and learning, students are encouraged to see the Boarding House as a safe space to practise English and build confidence. English should be spoken in mixed-language settings, with translation used respectfully if needed.

Designated times and spaces for English use help promote inclusion and communication. All boarders are expected to contribute to a respectful, welcoming community through thoughtful use of language and inclusive behaviour.

Boarding House Community Nights

Once a week, all boarders take part in 'House Night' activities. These evenings are designed to build community, encourage teamwork and give students a chance to relax and connect outside of the school day. Activities vary each week and may include games, creative challenges, guest speakers, movie nights or outings. House Nights are an important part of boarding life, and all students are required to participate.



Student Care

Student care at St Michael's Collegiate School involves both Pastoral Care and Academic Care. All boarders live in a cheerful residential house with boarding staff to offer support and create a caring family environment. The Boarding House provides a safe and secure environment where students can feel at home and focus on their personal and academic growth.

Pastoral Care

The Head of Boarding and Residential Supervisors manage the pastoral care of each boarder. The Head of Boarding also liaises with the pastoral care staff in the School to ensure the communication is maintained. Within the School, each student has a Mentor who they meet with each morning. They also work with the Head of School, School Chaplain and Educational Counsellor to ensure the wellbeing of each student. As part of our induction process, each new boarder meets with our Educational Counsellor to provide a formal opportunity to reflect on their introduction to boarding.

Academic Care and Support

At Collegiate, boarders are fully supported in their academic journey. Each student's progress is monitored by their Mentor, who works closely with teachers and boarding staff. The Head of Boarding also reviews academic reports and may attend parent-teacher interviews on behalf of families, helping students set goals and stay on track. Parents can contact their child's Mentor at any time, with contact details shared at the start of the year.

With continuous online assessment through myCollegiate, parents can stay up to date with their child's progress from anywhere in the world. Video conferences are available for parent-teacher meetings, and interpreters can be arranged if needed.

Boarders have access to free after-school Maths tutoring in the Sargison Library, and the collaborative boarding environment encourages peer-to-peer learning. Staff and supervisors are always available to provide academic guidance and support.

Students are encouraged to manage their own study schedules, with help available for time management, organisation and subject planning. The Head of Boarding and Educational Counsellor also assist with subject selection and university applications.

Many boarders enjoy studying together in shared spaces, where support is always within reach.

Examination and Study Days

During examination and study periods, where normal school timetables do not apply, students are expected to keep to normal school day routines as much as possible. We have found this is essential to academic success.

Breakfast is available until 9:00am, at which time students are expected to be out of bed. Students can then study in their rooms, classrooms (as available), the Library, Café 1892, the dining room or tables outside.

Students are not permitted to leave the School campus on weekdays between 8:30am to 3:30pm, except for approved activities such as appointments or tutorials.

During examinations, study snacks will be provided. Students are encouraged to maintain normal, healthy, balanced routines of sleep, recreation, study and exercise.



Visitors

Visitors are welcome in the Boarding House. To ensure the safety and comfort of all, the following protocols must apply:

- All visitors, including parents, must report to the Duty Office and introduce themselves to the staff member on duty. No parent should remove their child from the Boarding House at any time, especially overnight, without first contacting the Head of Boarding or Duty Staff. This is to ensure we always know the exact whereabouts of every boarder.
- Day students may be invited to the Boarding House during non-school hours only. These visitors must be signed in and out with the supervisor on duty.
- The Boarding House has a clearly defined policy about male visitors. Male visitors are permitted to visit in certain defined areas only. Fathers of students may access their child's room, provided they are accompanied by a member of staff or an adult female relative.
- Students who are found to be in breach of the School's policy on male visitors, will be asked to leave the Boarding House.
- Students can invite a guest to a meal or a female guest for an overnight sleepover on a Friday or Saturday night. Permission for this must be granted by the Head of Boarding. For an overnight stay, a guest boarding application must be completed by the guest's parent or guardian.

Meals and Dining

Meals are served in the cosy dining room at the heart of the Boarding House, creating a warm and communal atmosphere. Shared mealtimes are social occasions where good manners and mobile-free dinner conversations are encouraged.

All meals are freshly prepared in our on-site kitchen, with menus overseen by a nutritionist and prepared by our catering team. We prioritise nutrition, variety, and special dietary needs, and boarders are welcome to share feedback or menu suggestions.

Attendance at breakfast and dinner is expected, with supervisors marking rolls at each. Breakfast runs from 7:30am to 8:15am, and students must leave by 8:20am after tidying their area. Neat casual dress and footwear are required in the dining room, which all boarders help keep clean through a roster system.

Lunches are made by students three days a week using fresh ingredients provided, or saved from the previous evening. On two days, boarders may order from the School Café. As is tradition in Australia, lunch is typically a cold meal.

Boarders are supported in making healthy choices, and we encourage families to reinforce this at home. Excessive junk food may be removed, and leave may be restricted if poor eating habits continue.

Birthdays are a highlight, with students invited to choose their own dinner and dessert to celebrate. Requests must be made a week in advance by completing a short form with a supervisor.

Weekend Meals and Snacks

Weekend meals are a time to come together in the lively dining room — meals are to be enjoyed there and not taken upstairs. A tempting spread of fresh fruit, biscuits, bread, toast, noodles, and a variety of hot and cold drinks are always available for snacking.

Breakfast is served from 8:00am, lunch from noon, and dinner between 5:30pm and 6:00pm. Students help themselves and are expected to tidy up after every meal. Those who leave messes or dirty dishes risk extra duties or losing leave and privileges.

Keeping our dining space clean and welcoming is part of the Collegiate boarding spirit!



Holidays

The Boarding House usually closes at 12:00pm the day after school finishes each term and reopens at 12:00pm, two days before school starts. Exact dates will be emailed to parents and guardians and can be found on the School website.

Please note that unless arrangements have been made with the Head of Boarding, local students are permitted to stay in the Boarding House during term time only. Charges will apply for local students who stay at the Boarding House outside these times.

Local students are to take all their belongings with them at the end of the school year. International and interstate students may pack their belongings and leave them in storage within the Boarding House. Storage in rooms is generous, however, students with excessive belongings not kept neatly in their rooms, will need to send items home at their expense.



Communication

Clear communication between staff, boarders, and parents is essential. Students can use mail, email, social media, Skype, personal phones, and the Duty Office number to stay connected.

The myCollegiate Parent Portal provides official communications and the School Calendar. If required, please update your contact details by emailing reception@collegiate.tas.edu.au.

Wireless internet is available, with acceptable use policies applying. Boarding Wi-Fi switches off at 10:30pm weekdays and 11:30pm weekends to support good sleep.

Parents are encouraged to be 'friends' with their child on social media to stay connected and monitor content.

The Boarding House postal address is: C/- Collegiate Boarding House, 218 Macquarie Street, Hobart, TAS, 7000, Australia.

Mobile phones are recommended for safety and must be registered with the Head of Boarding. Students are expected to refrain from using phones during meals or social times; misuse may result in confiscation until the next day.

Middle School students are required to hand in mobile phones, iPads, computers and any other electronic devices at 8:30pm each night. Students in Years 9 and 10 are to hand in mobile phones at 9:30pm each night. The Boarding House reserves the right to remove any boarder's mobile phone, laptop or electrical device at bedtime. Years 11 and 12 are encouraged to secure their mobile phones overnight in charging lockers.

These arrangements promote awareness of, and consideration for peers. Research strongly supports that a sound sleep routine is important for the wellbeing and development of all adolescents. We ask that parents do not phone their child during mealtimes or after lights out. Messages can be left with duty staff and will be given to their child at the first opportunity. Urgent messages will be passed on immediately.



Social Conduct and Behaviour

Our Boarding House is a community built on a supportive and caring environment. The Boarding House is 'home' to students from rural Tasmania, interstate and overseas. We value our boarders because they enrich the School community with new and different perspectives.

Our Boarding House offers cheerful accommodation and encourages a sense of community, multiculturalism, cooperation and mutual respect. Those who fail to meet the expected standards of behaviour will be held accountable for their actions.

Guidelines are provided to assist with the smooth functioning of the house. All boarders are expected to familiarise themselves with the guidelines and regulations of the School and Boarding House. The main guidelines are as follows:

- All boarders are to respect the privacy of others. Entry into the rooms of others, without prior permission, is not allowed.
- Mobile phones are to be used in a socially responsible manner, including not using them during dinner, after lights out, or in formal social situations.
- No form of bullying will be tolerated.
- The use of English is encouraged in communal spaces. Where students from different language backgrounds are interacting in a group setting, English is to be the common language.
- Borrowing, taking or using belongings of others without permission is not allowed.
- For fire safety, boarders are not permitted to have personal heaters, kettles, cooking equipment, candles, matches or lighters. Any of these items will be confiscated by staff.
- The highest standards of courtesy and mutual respect are required for all interactions between staff, students and visitors. Swearing and other forms of inappropriate communication in any language will not be tolerated.
- Tobacco and illegal drugs are strictly prohibited. Students may be asked to take a drug test if it is suspected they are using such substances.
- Alcohol is not to be brought into the Boarding House under any circumstance. Students are also not to return to the Boarding House under the influence of alcohol. International students need to be aware that consuming or providing alcohol to persons under the age of 18 years can violate the conditions of their visa.
- Students should maintain their rooms in a clean and tidy state. Beds are to be made each morning and the floor must be kept clear. Students whose rooms are in an unsatisfactory condition in the morning will not be given afternoon leave until their room is clean and tidy. If boarders collect so many belongings that keeping their room clean is unmanageable, they will be asked to take or send belongings home.
- Dirty plates, cutlery, mugs, etc are not to be stored in bedrooms. Personal food items must be kept in sealed containers in bedrooms or named and placed in the dining room fridge. No responsibility is taken for food stored in the fridge by students.
- Students may not return to the Boarding House during the day to collect items. Students are encouraged to plan, be organised and use their lockers provided on campus.
- Shoes must always be worn in the dining room.

Any boarder who engages in unacceptable actions or behaviour will face serious consequences, as decided by the Head of Boarding and the Principal.

Restorative Process

St Michael's Collegiate School has a restorative approach to behaviour management. This requires that students take responsibility for their own actions and the effects that they have on others. Our restorative process involves a set of principles, strategies and skills, which recognise the importance of relationships, respect, responsibility and accountability. Should a boarder not respect the house expectations, the Head of Boarding will use the restorative process to resolve the situation.

Money Matters

It is preferable for all students to have their own bank account with access facilities for parents. This enables parents to guide their child in basic money matters. We can assist students with setting up a bank account upon request. All major banks are within easy walking distance from Collegiate. As an alternative, parents may wish to leave money in the Boarding House safe for withdrawal as a weekly allowance. In this way, students can develop their budgeting and financial skills.

The boarder's activity fee is paid by each boarder into a communal account. It is used for weekend, after school and other social events, for example Christmas and Easter. It is not pocket money. Accounts for Cabcharge and the pharmacy will be added to parents' accounts. This will be shown as 'Boarder's Sundries' on the account.



Medical

Boarders have access to professional medical services 24 hours a day. Excellent public and private hospitals are nearby. The following information is important:

Medical forms must be completed prior to a student's arrival in the Boarding House. All student details remain confidential, and it is the parent or guardian's responsibility to notify the Head of Boarding of any changes. Parents or guardians can give consent for boarding staff to administer paracetamol, ibuprofen and antihistamine.

A detailed list of regular medications is to be handed to the Head of Boarding with medication clearly labelled with the student's name. In the case of medication taken by senior boarders, they may, with our knowledge, be allowed to take responsibility for their own medication. Students are not to share medication, prescription or non-prescription, with other students under any circumstances. We ask that international students do not bring any medication except prescription medication. It is important that staff can read the instructions and ingredients on medication for the best care of students. It is of importance that students do not bring with them antibiotics unless prescribed by a doctor in Australia. We reserve the right to contact local parents and ask them to collect their unwell or injured child at any time.

In accordance with visa regulations, international students will require a medical certificate on the third day of illness. Local boarders who are ill for two consecutive days will either be sent home or required to seek medical attention and provide a doctor's certificate.

Students who wish to consult a doctor may prefer to use the Barrack Street Practice located adjacent to the School. An appointment can be made by boarding staff or by the student directly. Staff will accompany students to medical appointments, as required.

Parents of boarders remaining home after a weekend due to illness must inform both the duty supervisor and the School Reception of the student's absence. The duty supervisor can be contacted on +61 3 6211 4916 and the School Reception on +61 3 6211 4911.

At the request of students or parents, boarding staff may purchase pharmaceutical goods from the Davey Street Discount Pharmacy. Items will be billed to the student's school account.

Mental Health

On occasion, a boarder may present with a mental health issue. If this is the case, the Head of Boarding will contact the parent or guardian as soon as possible to discuss the sequence of events. Depending on the severity and frequency of the issue, the School and Boarding House, will work with the family, student and health professionals to devise and follow a mental health management plan.

If the Boarding House does not have the resources to manage the mental health issue, the boarder may be asked to seek alternative accommodation. This will be until such time they are assessed as ready to return to the Boarding House. The Boarding House and School will work with the student and family to help ensure a smooth transition back to the Boarding House. To help enable this transition, there must be a mental health management plan in place. This may necessitate that the student continues to seek assistance from health professionals.

Insurance and Security

While every effort is made to ensure the safety and security of property, the following conditions should be noted:

All passports and important documents are to be handed to the Head of Boarding on arrival. These items are maintained in a safe in the Head of Boarding's office. Students may have access to their property on request.

Students can store items in the safe within the Boarding House.

The School cannot carry insurance for individual student's belongings. It is therefore recommended that each student carry personal insurance for expensive items of personal property, including musical instruments, computers and cameras.

Motor Vehicle

Boarders are generally not permitted to have a vehicle at the School. Should a senior student wish to maintain a vehicle, the student and parents must agree to follow and sign the Driving Policy. There is no parking provided by the School for students. The Macquarie Street turning circle is for drop off and pick up only.

Boarders are not permitted to travel in a car driven by a person under the age of 21 years without prior permission from parents and guardians.

Laundry

Top loading washing machines and dryers are available free of charge for students to do their own washing. Senior students and supervisors will assist new and younger students. Washing powder and other essentials are required to be provided by the student.

Students should note the following points:

- Clothes and belongings should be clearly named, especially school uniforms.
- All clothes are to be removed from the laundry area as soon as they are washed and dried.
- Laundry may only be dried in the dryers, on drying racks on the veranda, or in drying rooms. Clothes are to be removed as soon as they are dry.



Leave Arrangements

Leave and attendance is recorded electronically via a platform called 'Reach', which operates via a secure online portal, ReachSMC. This allows staff, parents and boarders to collaborate in a real-time, unified and consistent manner across all devices.

Parents need to set up an account and create their child's host list. You can add and remove people from your child's host list as required. All you need is internet access and your account details.

If you have a son in The Hutchins School Boarding House, please speak to us about linking Reach accounts for both schools.

You can save the portal <https://smcs.reachboarding.com.au/> as a bookmark to easily find it. There are inbuilt videos for each aspect of the dashboard that pop up as you click on the dashboard buttons.

All overnight leave, mid-term and end of term departures will be generated electronically through Reach's web-based system. Except for local leave, all leave, must be approved by a member of staff. Parents can submit a leave request for their child to have leave with anyone on their host list. The host list can be updated at any time using the web-based system.

Students should submit an electronic leave form at least two hours before the time they would like to depart. This allows senior staff time to review and approve the leave.

If for any reason the period of nominated leave changes, the person on duty must be contacted immediately. Students are expected to have their mobile phones with them, charged and turned on during leave.

Students will also have their own secure access to the Reach system. This will allow them to apply for leave relevant to their respective year levels. Doing this in advance will expedite their departure and enhance the chances of leave being granted.

Weekday Leave

Students may seek local leave to visit Hobart or Sandy Bay shopping precinct after school, attend cocurricular activities or to exercise in local parks.

They must return to school by 5:30pm, unless at a cocurricular activity. All students must report to the person on duty before and after their return.

Years 5 to 7 students must be accompanied by a student in Year 9 or above, or a staff member. Year 8 students must be accompanied by at least one other student. Evening leave with family is automatically granted, although advanced notice is always appreciated. Students still need to make sure they sign out. Any other evening leave needs to be approved through the Head of Boarding.

In summary, the procedure for weekday leave is:

- Seek permission from the person on duty, submit an electronic leave application if applicable and sign out through the duty staff.
- Overnight leave can only be arranged through the Head of Boarding.
- Upon returning, students must notify the person on duty.

Weekend Leave

Students can take local leave for up to four hours in the local area of the Boarding House. Any leave over four hours requires permission from the Head of Boarding. Evening leave beyond 5:30pm requires permission from the Head of Boarding and must be submitted via the Reach Platform.

The safety and wellbeing of our students is our priority. As such, we must always know where they are. Whenever a student leaves the Boarding House, but is remaining on campus, students must notify the staff member on duty.

Responsibility of Hosts

Parents of boarders are asked to contact their child’s hosts on occasions where they have agreed to take responsibility for their child, particularly overnight care. It is important that parents are comfortable with the family with whom their child is spending time. Boarding staff, particularly the Head of Boarding, will often contact a host or guardian to confirm leave arrangements. This is also an opportunity for boarding staff to get to know the host.

Evenings are of special concern. If a host believes that a party is being held, they should ensure that the boarder attends only by personal invitation. They should check that the means of transport is safe and adequate, and that supervision at the party is by mature and responsible adults. We strongly recommend that a host should telephone the parents of the student or boy who is hosting the party to obtain further information.

Please encourage host families to contact boarding staff if they have any queries about any details of your child’s leave. It is vital that students are properly and adequately supervised during their leave from school.

The boarding staff will take responsibility for communicating with hosts on behalf of international parents as required.

School Day Weekly Routine

7:00am	Wake up.
7:30am	Breakfast.
8:25am	Mentor time. All students to be out of Boarding House.
8:45am	Morning lessons begin. There are two lesson periods before recess.
10:25am	Recess: food to be collected from the dining room or Canteen.
10:50am	Lessons resume. There are two lesson periods before lunch.
12:30pm	Lunch Meals are available for collection from the School Café or Canteen.
1:15pm	Afternoon lessons begin. There are three lessons before school finishes.
3:35pm	Check in with duty staff in dining room, afternoon tea available.
5:30pm	Afternoon leave curfew.
5:45pm	Dinner.
8:30pm	Bedtime commences according to the schedule. Students are to be considerate of noise from this time.
10:00pm	No showers after this time. All students are to be in bedrooms and quiet.

No student is to be in another room, wandering around the house or making disruptive noise after designated 'lights out'.

During school days, the Boarding House is closed to all students between 8:20am to 3:30pm. Senior boarders in Years 11 and 12 may have access to their rooms during their study periods in Lessons 1 and 2 and Lessons 6 and 7.

Bedtimes

There is an established routine and schedule for bedtime as detailed in the chart below. All students are expected to be prepared for bed at the specified times. 'Lights out' is 10 minutes after the specified time. Years 11 and 12 have a specified time when they are expected to be in their rooms, engaged in study or quiet activity. Students who are caught misbehaving at bedtime or who are late into bed will lose 10 minutes off their bedtime. This will continue until their behaviour improves.

Parents are asked not to phone their child after bedtime or lights out. Students receiving or making phone calls after this time will have their mobile phone confiscated. Years 5 to 8 will have their mobile phones taken at bedtime and secured, along with laptops and other miscellaneous electronic equipment, at the discretion of staff, items will be returned to students in the morning. Years 9 and 10 need to hand in mobile phones at 9:30pm, along with computers and other electrical items, at the discretion of staff.

Suggested Requirements for Boarders

All school uniform items should be clearly named with sewn woven name tags or laundry pen. These may be ordered from the School Shop. Orders need to be placed six weeks in advance to allow for delivery.

Linen

All linen and towels will be provided by the Boarding House. Students are welcome to bring their own pillow, rug or quilt cover. Please make sure they are clearly named.

Sundries (can be purchased in Hobart)

- Hot water bottle or wheat pack
- One named mug
- Shoe cleaning kit
- Cuddly toys, posters, personal items
- Washing powder
- Hair dryer

Please note that electric blankets and candles are not allowed for safety reasons.



Essential toiletries (can be purchased in Hobart)

- Toothbrush and toothpaste
- Hairbrush or comb
- Shampoo and conditioner
- Body wash or soap
- Deodorant
- Face wash
- Sanitary products

Electrical items

All students' electrical items will be checked by the School, to guarantee they meet Australian safety standards. If they do not pass inspection, items will be sent home. The Boarding House will provide adaptors for items with international plugs to be used safely in Australia. Please do not bring adaptors purchased in other countries. We recommend buying electrical items such as USB chargers and hairdryers in Australia, so they comply with Australian standards. Please do not bring personal kettles, heaters or cooking appliances as they cannot be used for safety reasons and will be kept safe until they can be returned to the boarder's home.

Australia's electrical current is 240/250 volts AC. 50 cycles and a three-pin plug is used. Adaptors are provided and a transformer may be required for appliances that operate on a different voltage.

- An outfit suitable for dances and special occasions year-round.

Please note that a 20kg limit usually applies to checked luggage (please confirm with your chosen airline).

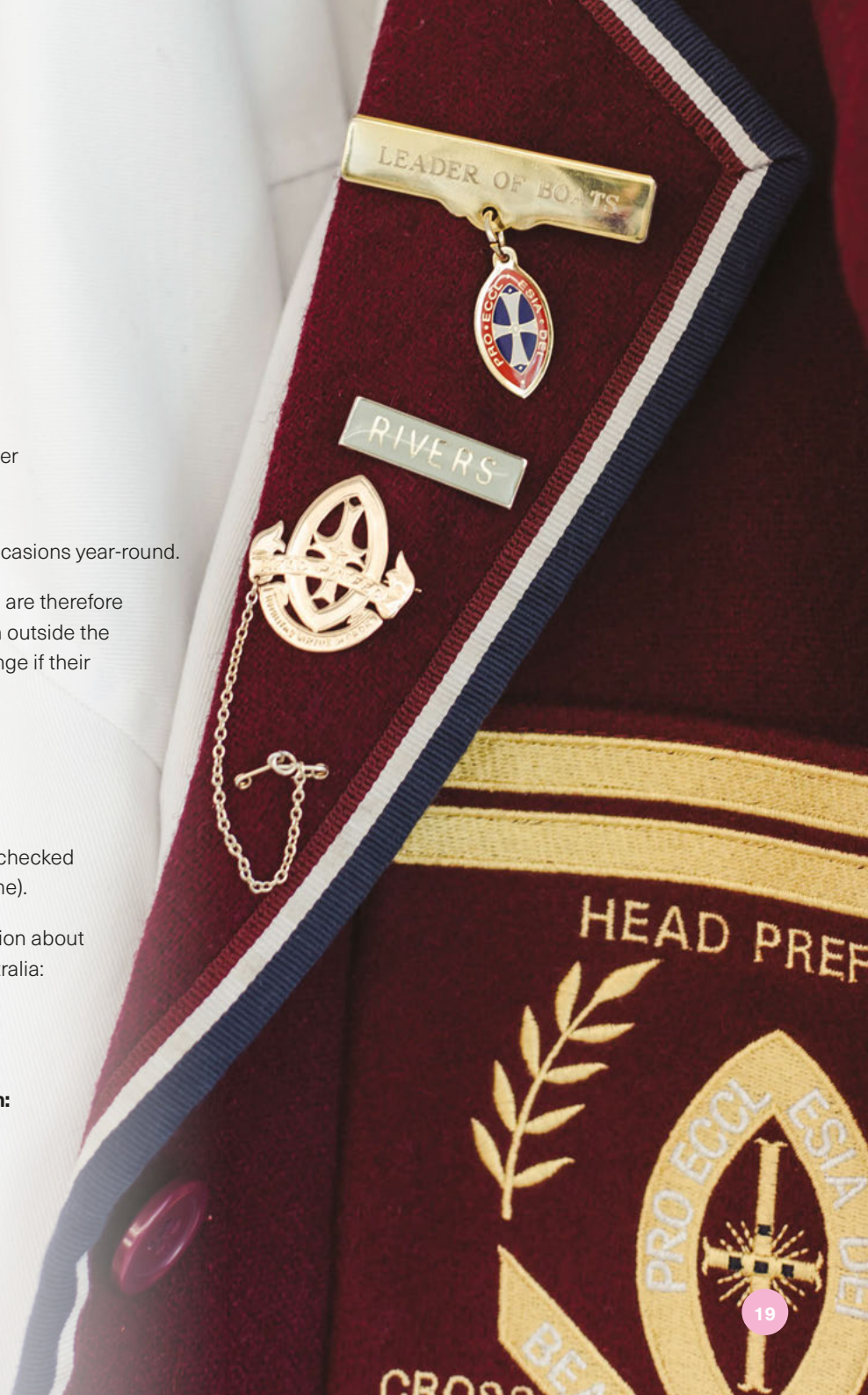

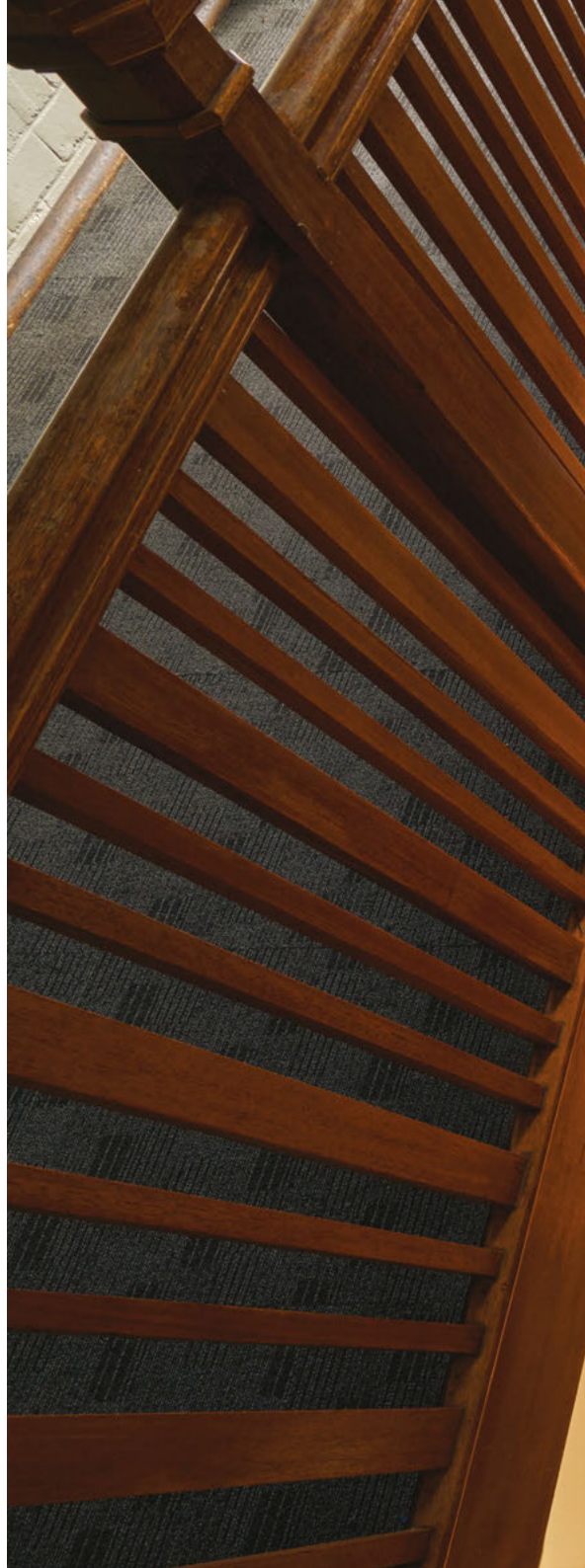
